


THE NUMBER OF




Non-Hispanic Whites 2000-2010


THE NUMBER OF JEWS








Persons in Jewish Households, 1989-2010



Number of Jews, 1989-2010




PERCENTAGE OF HOUSEHOLDS IN THE ÅREA WHO ÅRE JEWISH HOUSEHOLDS







(Adults in Jewish Households)




LENGTH OF RESIDENCE IN DETROIT AREA - 2005

(Respondents)




NEW HOUSEHOLDS (0-4 YEARS)




LONG-TERM HOUSEHOLDS (20 OR MORE YEARS)




PERCENTAGE OF ADULT CHILDREN WHO HAVE ESTABLISHED THEIR OWN HOMES IN LOCAL AREA

(From Households in Which the Respondent Is Age 50 or Over)




THE GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION OF JEWS

DISTRIBUTION OF JEWISH HOUSEHOLDS






LOCAL SYNAGOGUE MEMBERSHIP



DENOMINATION OF SYNAGOGUE MEMBERSHIP 2005 AND 2010













NUMBER OF CHILDREN IN JEWISH DAY SCHOOL












JEWISH FEDERATION ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

(Not Adjusted for Inflation)




JEWISH FEDERATION ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

(Adjusted for Inflation to 2010 Dollars)




AVERAGE DONATION PER HOUSEHOLD TO JEWISH FEDERATION

(Adjusted for Inflation)




LOCAL JEWISH FEDERATION ANNUAL CAMPAIGN

Note about Differences Since 2005

- 1. This slide set was created in April 2011.
- 2. The original Detroit 2005 slide sets used comparisons with communities that completed studies from 1986 to 2005.
- 3. The following slides, which only contains slides comparing Detroit with other Jewish communities, uses comparisons with communities completing studies from 1993 to 2010.
- 4. Some minor differences may occasionally be found in the percentages on these slides and those in the 2005 slide set. In most of these cases, minor definitional changes were made or programming was improved.
- 5. Some slides have been created in the past few years and were not part of the original study.
- 6. See next slide for a list of deleted, updated, and added communities
- 7. Note that the following slides only include a small subset of the 367 slides like these available at www.jewishdatabank.org



- 1. Thus, 5 older communities were deleted, 5 communities have been updated to newer studies, and 7 communities have been added.
- 2. In addition, many communities appear on many more slides than was the case in 2005. This researcher obtained the original data sets for all communities and was able to produce results for these slides that were not available in the original reports completed by the study consultants.
- 3. Thus, the average number of communities per slide has increased, rendering more meaningful comparisons.


AGE 0-17

(Persons in Jewish Households)




AGE 65 AND OVER

(Persons in Jewish Households)




PERCENTAGE OF CHILDREN AGE 0-12 LIVING IN HOUSEHOLDS WITH FULL-TIME WORKING PARENTS

(Children Age 0-12 in Jewish Households)





(Children Age 0-17 in Jewish Households)




Persons Age 75 and Over Living Alone














HEAD OF HOUSEHOLD AGE 35-49

(Couples Intermarriage Rate)








PARTICIPATED IN A LOCAL JCC PROGRAM IN THE PAST YEAR WITHOUT BEING A MEMBER






ATTENDED AN ADULT JEWISH EDUCATION PROGRAM OR CLASS IN THE PAST YEAR








EXCELLENT PERCEPTIONS OF JEWISH FEDERATION

(Respondents Who Are Very/Somewhat Familiar)





(Households with Adults Age 18-64)




















PROBABILITY OF MOVING WITHIN THE NEXT THREE YEARS



DEFINITELY OR PROBABLY MOVING OUT OF LOCAL METROPOLITAN AREA




PERSONS IN JEWISH HOUSEHOLDS BY GEOGRAPHIC ÅREA 2010












JEWISH FEDERATION OTHER CAMPAIGNS

(Adjusted for Inflation to 2010 Dollars)




Number of Donors To Jewish Federation Annual Campaign




